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Landfill sites and land proposed to be allocated in the Allocations Plan

There are nine allocation policies in the proposed AP where there are known landfill (historic or authorised sites) which cover part of the land allocated or adjoin it. The sites are listed below

Three of the sites are allocated for recreational use and any changes to the surface would be likely to be limited. The other six sites are covered by policies that identify existing sites for the continuation of the current uses and could allow intensification. One allocates land for redevelopment for employment and housing, and in this instance may adjoin an area formerly used for landfill. All of the sites that are identified for employment and housing have been developed for a number of years and are allocated for redevelopment.

Whilst the information on which the above is based provides a good indication of the location of sites formerly used for landfill, further investigation will always be required at the stage when planning applications are made.

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
